Dear People of Grace,

"Thank you." Those are the words that I think are most fitting to open what will, God willing, be the first of many, many communications I'll be sharing with you all in this season of ministry before us together. John and I have been absolutely overwhelmed, in the best possible way, by the thoughtfulness, care, hospitality with which you all have welcomed us into your parish community. Relocating is a taxing experience on the body, mind, and soul, and we have been delighted and moved to find so many balms of comfort awaiting us here in Nyack and at 128 1st Avenue. So, "thank you," indeed, for all you've done to get us off on the right foot together in 2023!

As fate would have it, I spent a good amount of time on that "right foot" during my first days here in Nyack. You see, shortly after the movers left, and with the unboxing well under way, I set off for my first solo trip to the Home Depot for a few moving-in items. I was delighted to find that the directions on my phone timed the journey at under ten minutes, and off I zipped for a very short jaunt on the thruway. But just as I was making my way up the entrance ramp to the highway, I noticed a certain amber light glowering at from my dashboard. "EPC," it cautioned. And then, "Oh no," I thought to myself. "What does 'EPC' stand for?" I guessed "E" was for engine, and maybe "C" was for control... but beyond that, I had no idea what the light was telling me I should do next. Aside from the light illuminating, there was no sign of trouble with the engine or controls. But I wondered...would it be safe to continue on? Should I pull over right away? Can I make it to a safe place to park and look up what "EPC" means? Well, the short of it is that I gingerly made my way to the next exit, and into the Home Depot parking lot, where I looked up "EPC" in the manual for guidance on what to do next. "Take the car for service immediately," it advised. And so I did, just a few miles away at the ever-so-conveniently nearby VW service center.

It turns out that a repair was needed to my engine, and that the parts would have to be ordered and delivered before I could get in for an appointment and be back "firing on all cylinders" again. When I got that news, I felt that heavy weight of "Ugh" pressing down upon me. Sure, the situation could have been worse. I could have been stuck somewhere needing a rescue. I could have had an incident out on the highway. But still, "carless" was not the way I envisioned I would be spending my first days in Nyack. It was going to be a nuisance. It was going get in the way. It was going to slow things down.

But as it turns out, I think slowing things down, and literally taking things one step at a time turned out to be just what I needed. One foot before the other, step by step by step, I paced my way up and down the streets of my new neighborhood through those first days, popping in and out of the local businesses, looking and listening and noticing all the details of community life that are so easy to miss while sealed inside the confines of a vehicle cabin.

Was my inopportune car trouble a sign of God's intervention in my life, inviting (forcing?) me to take things a bit slower, and to savor those first impressions of my new home? Perhaps. Was the experience of meeting Nyack on my feet rather than on my wheels a gift to my soul and to my heart and to my body, just when I needed it? For sure. So, in gratitude for right beginnings, and for getting off on the right feet, again I say, "Thank You." Thank you, Grace Church. Thank you, Nyack. Thank you, God. Now let us travel onward, all together!
