Minutes of the 162nd Annual Meeting of Grace Episcopal Church, held on Sunday, February 12, 2023.

The Rev. Dr. Dustin Trowbridge opened the meeting at 8:56 in the church after the 8 a.m. service. The following appointments were made: Sally Ann Mock, secretary of the meeting; Katharine Fulmor and Emily Nevill, tellers for the meeting. The report of the nominating committee was read by Katharine Fulmor. The recess was moved by Patti Hyland and seconded by Nancy Waack. All present approved.

The meeting was returned to order at 11:31 in Memorial Hall with over a hundred in attendance.

The minutes of the 2022 meeting were approved by those present on a motion by Jeff McDowell and seconded by Jim Cochran.

The Rev. Dr. Trowbridge opened with 3 questions those present were asked to answer: who would you go to for wisdom; who would be asked to get people together; and who would you talk to that makes decisions. For the Parochial Report everyone was asked to write their name, age and racial/ethnic category.

Finance Warden Jeff McDowell reported that the 2022 budget ended with the surplus thanks to several donations. The balanced budget for 2023 was approved by all on the motion by Roy Kepler, seconded by Katharine Fulmor. Jeff McDowell thanked those who serve as counters on Sunday mornings, the Treasurer and finance Committee, Pat Cose, and the Search Committee.

Property Warden Emily Nevill reported on the work done in the rectory in anticipation of the arrival of the new rector. Re the church she reported on the termite damage to the wall between the Narthex and the church area itself.

Organist choirmaster Brandon Beachamp thanked all the choir members who worked thorough the last few years as the church was starting up after being closed because of Covid. He mentioned the affect weather has had on the church organ and the pianos around the church.

Verne Becker gave a report on the Adult Spiritual Committee and Sandra Rodriguez reported on the Children/Youth ministry events during the year.

No nomination coming from the floor, Father Dustin called for the slate of candidates to be elected by acclamation.

Thank you and special recognition to the outgoing vestry members, Kevin Faherty and Margie Winslow followed. A Special Acknowledgement was given to retiring Parish Administrator, Thayer Woodcock, who was given a certificate to Hudson House.

Commissioning of the new elected members of the Vestry, Diocesan Convention Delegates and alternates, and the 2023 Nominating Committee followed.

The meeting ended at 12:55 with a blessing by Father Dustin and a closing hymn, with adjournment moved by Jeff McDowell and seconded by a Katharine Fulmor.

BIOGRAPHIES OF NOMINEES



Emily Nevill (Sr./Finance Warden)

James Cochran (Convention Alternate)



WORSHIP AND MUSIC

REPORT OF THE RECTOR

At the time of last year's Annual Meeting, I had been in my position for barely a month. So, in my written report, I shared with you all a bit of background into what the process was like that brought us all together through your Rector Call process. I've now been with Grace Church for over a year, and as you will read in the following reports, 2023 was a year of great accomplishments and progress. Some ministries continued to chug along as they have for years. Others got their footing once again after enduring the double challenges of a clergy transition and the Covid-19 pandemic. And still others tried out new ways of being Grace Church for our present day and circumstances. I hope you will read the following reports closely and carefully. These pages are relatively few, but they reflect and summarize countless hours of time and extraordinary attention that the members of Grace Church have invested in our parish's life over the past year. The shining acknowledgements and words of gratitude that follow pale in comparison to the Light of Christ burning in so many hearts together in this parish. So, do please join me in thanking all those who contributed to these reports and their contents when next your paths cross. The vast majority of the work and ministry of Grace rests on the shoulders and in the hands of your fellow parishioners and your devoted leaders.

There are so many souls to thank in so many ways, but I want to start off our Annual Reporting by lifting up your wardens Jeff McDowell and Emily Nevill for hearty round of applause. In all my years of lay and ordained ministry with Episcopal Churches, I've never worked alongside leaders of such dedication and commitment as Jeff and Emily. I could go on and on about how many hours of service and how much persistence of spirit it has taken your wardens to oversee the Finance and Properties Committees of this church, let alone the various other additional hats that they both wear. But, I fear that if I did, we might never find souls willing to accept a nomination to serve as warden again! So, I will just say Thank You again to Jeff and Emily, for their dedication and leadership during my first year here at Grace.

In my first year at Grace, I've engaged in the usual tasks of ministry that one would expect from a parish priest, hopefully in a way that aligned with what Grace was seeking in your Parish Profile. But what I think might be most important for me to highlight in this Annual Report of mine is a look at the staffing transitions, both planned and unplanned, that occurred this year. When I came on board to this parish in January, I had no idea just how much time and energy I was going to spend on employee changes through the coming months. Those transitions have deeply affected the core functions of our parish operations, and they will continue to impact our church's identity well into the future. So...what happened?

Even before I moved to Nyack last winter, I was made aware that the longtime parish administrator was planning to retire soon after my arrival. Thayer Woodcock had kindly held on all through the clergy transition, when perhaps she would have preferred to make her exit far earlier. So, I had the great good fortune of overlapping with Thayer from January 16th to April 13th (but who's counting?). But then, the day came when it was time for us all to say good-bye and God Bless to Thayer, and as I watched her leave the office door one last time, I was keenly aware that 23 years' worth of experience and skill and institutional knowledge were heading out with her. The long-term impact of that transition cannot be overstated. Thayer was the constant, when at least five permanent and interim priests came and went. She was the keeper of all knowledge, the one-stop-shop where just about everyone's need could be met and most questions could be answered. There was never going to be a replacement to find for Thayer. There would only be "what's next."

I quickly found that embarking on that journey to "what's next" would be a challenge, one that would turn into a running theme throughout the months to come. Finding Grace's next office support staff person would first mean updating a written job description that hadn't been worked on in decades. It meant ensuring that we were compliant with the latest Diocesan HR Guidelines for Lay Employees. And it meant finding a unicorn that could dance on the head of a pin, in a haystack...preferably one that was equally comfortable with

Canva, Constant Contact, and Publisher, one that knew the difference between The Collect for Purity and The Prayer of Humble Access, and one could telepathically sense a parishioner's hospital admission. After working with an ad hoc committee to craft the job description and interview candidates, we finally found our next Parish Administrator in Elida Cacevic, a long-time resident of Nyack with a background working in the office of a Roman Catholic Convent. Did we manage to mind-meld Elida with Thayer, and transfer those 23 years of experience and skills over to our newest staff member? Alas, no. I'm afraid it will take another 23 years for anyone to get to that place. But we have in Elida a committed soul who I believe enjoys the challenges of her new position, who is well-suited to the interpersonal communications and interactions required of her, and who embodies our commitment to diversity and community.

About a month after Thayer left the office, our Music Director Brandon Beachamp shared with me his intention to leave his position in August. Once again, we began to prepare for a long-term employee's departure, to examine our music program's current needs, and to start the search for the next leader of Grace's music ministry. Again, a committee was formed to create a new job description, one that incorporated the findings of a series of Listening Sessions that were held over the summer to gather input from parishioners about their likes, concerns, and wishes for our music program. The search was an extensive one, and involved hours of time, both of our search committee participants and our choir members. Ultimately, I feel we found an excellent match in Jie Yi Segal, who officially joined us in January. In just the few first weeks he's been with us, Jie has enthusiastically joined into the weekly and daily rhythms of life at 130 First Ave. And once again, with this new hire, we are meeting Grace's commitment to diversity and community.

Thayer and Brandon were not the only long-time staff departing our community in 2023, however. In August, our Property Manager Virginia Kosloff left our offices to take a full-time opportunity with a local real estate firm. Virginia's position was somewhat different from our Parish Administrator and Music Director positions, though. The weekly hours of that position were far fewer, and the needs and realities of managing our properties had shifted significantly over the years, most recently with the addition of a new and highly capable and experienced sexton Jim Sevier. So, this time, as I looked over Virginia's original job description from about a decade ago, I realized Grace needed to consider carefully what its current resources and needs were for property management. Ultimately, I decided to try and see if, in 2024, we might be able to allocate our property tasks to our current Parish Administrator and Sexton, increasing their hours and compensation proportionately. Since so much of the work of property administration and management involves daily backand-forth communications and scheduling of appointments with tenants, contractors, inspectors, etc., I figured it might be best to have staff members who are on campus most days of the week take over those duties. We are still working out the details of that staffing adaptation, but for the time being, we seem to be streamlining and simplifying those efforts.

"That was a lot of time talking about staffing, and not a lot of time talking about Jesus!" you might be thinking to yourself. That's true. And in the pages to come, you'll read lots and lots of words about how God's Spirit has been on the move at Grace Church. But I thought it important, in this year of such tremendous staffing changes, that I share with you a little more information about those efforts that have commanded so much of my attention and care this year. I do truly hope not to have to continue with these sorts of changes in 2024! But I also recognize that navigating these challenges is hard work that needs to be done well and carefully, if the parish is going to be able to continue moving forward with such profound changes to its staffing pillars. Thank you for helping Elida and Jie find a home here at Grace, and thrive in their new positions.

2023 was a rather momentous year for music at Grace. We bid farewell to Brandon Beachamp, our Organist and Choir Master for 11 years, and set out on a lengthy search for a new Music Director. In December, Fr. Dustin named Jie Yi Segal to the position.

However our musical life at Grace continued. Music was provided for all three Sunday services - at the 8:00 by Jan Valentine, harp and David Starling, guitar; the 9:30 by Brandon and Jan; the 11:00, as well as a number of other liturgical services, first by Brandon and the choir and then Jan and the choir. Many thanks to all. In the first half of the year there was also Evensong once a month. Easter featured a spectacular brass ensemble with a postlude that moved many to tears. In December we celebrated Advent with a service of Lessons and Carols. The fall and Christmas brought a number of pieces arranged for choir and saxophone by Jan and the world premiere of a piece by Jacob Nevill.

2023 also we enjoyed a post-Evensong concert by the Women's Ensemble of the Nyack Community Chorus, including a piece by choir member Mary Ann Bleekner, as well as concerts by the full NCC. There was Joyful Noise, a recital by voice students in June.

In December, GraceMusic made its post-Covid return with a very well received Messiah Sing and nascent plans for 2024.

Thank you to all who participated in the music life of Grace, especially Brandon Beachamp for his many years of leadership and friendship, and Jan Valentine for all her contributions, especially this fall and Christmas.

In January, 2023, Grace Episcopal Church welcomed The Rev. Dr. Dustin Trowbridge as our new rector. He has brought energy to our worship services and the overall church leadership.

The Altar Guild of Grace Church invites any and all who are interested in working behind the scenes at our worship services to consider joining Larry and Stephanie Campbell and myself by becoming member of the Guild. You will learn about the working around the Altar, i.e. setting it up, seasonal/holiday changes, what elements are called, what the rector needs (and doesn't need or want). Over the years the scope of work has



changed but the fundamentals are always the same: to serve the rector, the parish, the church, and God.

In addition to caring for the Altar set ups weekly, the Altar Guild is responsible for the Flower Funds Perpetual Fund which pays for the weekly Altar flowers and supplies needed to carry on our work. If you wish to have flowers on the altar yearly in memory of a departed loved one, the fee is \$300. If you would like to have extra flowers on the altar during the year the fee is \$30. The only time flowers are not on the Altar are during the season of Advent and the season of Lent when only greens are used.

FINANCE AND PROPERTY

REPORT OF THE FINANCE (SENIOR) WARDEN

2023 – was an interesting year – Fr. Dustin started his ministry with us are our Rector, but we also saw departures – Thayer Woodcock our long serving parish administrator and source of all things about Grace retired shortly after Easter. Our organist/choir director Brandon Beachamp departed at the end of the summer, and Virginia Kosloff our property administrator left too. It was also a year of new beginnings. Elida Cacevic took on the role of Parish Administrator and a new Organist/Choir Director Jie Yi Segal was hired at the end of the year. It may be that Grace Church is now embarked on a promising normal.

Operating Budget 2023

Good News, we ended 2023 with a \$57K surplus.

Ex**penses**

There were some areas that exceeded what was budgeted – maintenance and cleaning were \$10K over budget, and our expenses for a supply organist was considerably higher than budgeted for. However other areas were substantially below what had been budgeted for. For Grace like any other organization – personnel costs – salaries, pensions, benefits are by far the largest portions of an operating budget. This year, like the last two years, our personnel costs have been substantially below what was budgeted. And, the savings in those costs are the primary drivers of our surplus this year.

Income:

For 2023 our pledge income was slightly higher than budgeted for, plate gifts were more generous, our gifts other than pledge were robust, rentals were a little above budget and we also used \$52K in surpluses from previous years.

Surpluses.

As with 2021, 2022 we end the year with a surplus – this year it will be close to \$52K. While those surpluses are welcome, there are significant reasons why we have had them and should not expect such surpluses in the future. Look at the 2023 end of year report under wages and benefits. That came in at over \$30K less than budgeted for. Why – our parish administrator left in the spring and her position was not filled for several months. Our property administrator left and we have not filled that position. And, finally, our organist/ choir director left in August and while we had a substitute organist, her compensation was substantially less. Staff vacancies in 2022 – see last year's report and for 2021 were due in large part to the same reason (We also had PPP loan forgiveness in 2021 and 2022). Unless a staff person departs in 2024, we should not expect similar savings.

.2024 Budget

We present to Grace the 2024 operating budget – \$607, 047. With a very small surplus of about \$14.00. The 2024 budget was presented to the Vestry and approved at its December 2023 meeting in accordance with the by-laws of Grace Church Nyack. In January, using updated pledge estimates and end of year reports, an amended budget was presented to the vestry and approved. That is the budget presented in this report.

The budget committee (Karin Baere, Emily Nevill, Adrienne Langford, Fr. Dustin, Patty Hyland, Kickie Fulmar, and Jeff McDowell) began meeting in early November. For over a month we met and reviewed the current budget, the budget history at Grace, looked at expected income, expected expenses and committee and commission chairs were asked to submit budget requests along with explanations. The budget committee also began asking questions about the Grace budgets of the past. Like – why does an Episcopal Church not include in its operating budget the cost of communion wafers? Or flowers? Or its contributions from social ministry to charities?

Grace has funds that stand outside its operating budget that it has used in the past to pay what are truly church operating expenses. Those funds are supported by non-pledge income – gifts. For example, when Grace receives an undesignated gift of \$5000 or more, the Vestry has determined that 10% of that income goes to the Organ Fund and 10% goes to Social Ministry. In the recent past, a similar percentage went into the flower fund instead of the organ fund. In a desire to be more transparent about our operating expenses, we decided to move funds from those funds into the operating budget and account for them as both income and expenditures.

Looking at the budget for 2024 you will see a few new items under both income and expenses that are new. The flower fund has been used to pay for communion wafers, sacramental wine and other liturgical expenses. You will see funds transferred from the flower fund to a line in the operating budget for worship/sacristan. Similar transfers from flower fund for weekly and holiday flowers, as well as Social Ministry have been done. Other items in the budget that will look different from the past. You will note under interest income – we project that interest income in 2024 will be substantially higher than it has been in past years. In the Spring, the Vestry voted to move \$150,000 from our no interest checking and low interest savings accounts at Key Bank to an 8-month CD at Chase Bank that will pay 4% interest. The Vestry in March will decide what to do with that CD.

As to the overall budget. Our pledge for 2024 is higher than it has ever been. The Vestry used the figure of \$351078 for the budget. Other sources of income – gifts other than pledge – we have every reason to expect those gifts will continue, our income from 1st avenue will continue, we will do our formulaic drawdowns from our quasi-endowment, other rentals seem steady, we will draw down more from the Cropsey fund than we have and we will use about \$23K or our past years surpluses.

From the expenditure side. Our assessment has increased, we will not receive the property insurance bill for 2024 but expect it will go up. We will allocate more finds to maintenance. The interest payments for the Bradley Chapel roof loan will cease this June and the principle will be repaid from funds that have been set aside. The largest increase in expenditures is in our personnel costs that reflect our expectation that no one is leaving. Our rector and our organist/choir director continue. We have eliminated the property administrator position and increased the hours of our parish administrator and sextant to pick up the tasks the property administrator took care of. We have budgeted our security person (the building is locked up every night) to be paid for 366 days this year.

The budget being presented to the congregation is a prudent one, neither wildly optimistic nor pessimistic. It provides resources for investment in new endeavors or safety nets should unexpected challenges occur. Finally, my thanks to all those who assisted with our financial operations in 2023. The Standing Committee on Finance (Cindy Cox, Kickie Fulmar, Theresa Bergen, Emily Nevill, Adriene Langford, Paul Shusterman, Holly Bee, Sarah Stiles, Karen Hughes, Mike Growney, Sally Ann Mock, Fr. REPORT OF THE PROPERTY (JUNIOR) WARDEN

Give us such an awareness of your mercies, that with truly thankful hearts we may show forth your praise, not only with our lips, but in our lives, by giving up our selves to your service..." (The General Thanksgiving, BCP, p. 101). Working with Grace Church's 150 year old properties these past two years has been a great joy for me. I'm so grateful for the many gifts that God has given us in these walls and for the opportunity to be one of many who serve in maintaining them. A few highlights from the year:

Choir Loft

We engaged the structural engineering services of DR Pilla to establish the extent of the termite damage to the choir loft and plan for repair. Thankfully the damage appears to be limited to the lower structure. Quotes for replacement of the damaged beam, paneling, and ceiling tiles are currently being solicited. Watch for upcoming opportunities to contribute to the costs of the repair work.

Music Director's Office

Our time without a music director brought the opportunity to rehab that office for the first time in 30+ years. It was a veritable archaeological dig of the history of music at Grace—and of past building practices! We upgraded non-grounded electrical outlets, replaced dim lighting, and installed new flooring to cover damaged presumed asbestos tiles. The women's choir robing room also received new flooring and a fresh coat of paint. Thanks to Sally Cochran, John Howell, and Jacob Nevill for their help in sorting through piles and files of music.



First Avenue Rentals



The 137 2nd floor apartment was substantially rehabbed with new flooring, windows, and refrigerator and rented in May to a new Section 8 tenant. Now two of our five units are rented in this way, which maximizes our income by charging full market rent while also providing housing to some of those most in need. The old playground equipment and yard coverings left from when the property housed the Rockland Parent Child Center were removed by Arborview Landscape and the backyard was graded and seeded. At 145, both furnaces were replaced by Blend Air after a routine heating

system tuneup revealed that they were leaking dangerous levels of carbon monoxide.

Rectory

Babbitt House only required a little attention after all the work we invested in 2022. Some cracked stairs were repaired by Michael DeMarco. The boiler was repaired and the water heater was replaced by Blend Air. A pink dogwood was planted in the front yard as required by the Village of Nyack to to replace the trees that were removed the previous year. Thanks to Karine Baere and John Colgan for assisting with this project.

Church

We tackled a number of significant projects at the church in 2023:

• James Walsh of Rock Solid repointed the northwest corner of the church, installed new joints in the bluestone walkway, and replaced several damaged stones. This eliminated several tripping hazards and ensured the integrity of our walkways for the years to come.

- The exterior lights that illuminate the stained glass behind the altar at night had corroded and were placed by All Bright. Bonus: the light switches inside are now consistent and intuitive to operate.
- Our wireless smoke detectors were past their life expectancy and beginning to malfunction and were replaced by Inter County.
- To accompany our new, robust wifi (more on that below), Blend Air installed programmable, wifi-compatible thermostats around the building to replace old ones that were constantly running too hot or cold.

We should realize significant savings on utility bills by not heating unused spaces.

- In light of the termite issue in the church and other insect and rodent concerns around our properties, we established a contract with Erhlich to handle termite control for the church and pest control across all properties.
- Many administrative projects were tackled, including the creation of a record of people with church keys, an annual maintenance calendar, and a log of major repairs and maintenance work.




One of the crowning achievements of the year is the installation of wifi throughout the church and of ethernet for all the office computers. Verne Becker championed this project and put in countless hours interfacing with the All Bright electricians and Frontline Data Services technicians. We now have fast internet access, have eliminated the many cords that created tripping hazards, and can take advantage of technology to save energy, improve security, and much more. We are grateful to the estate of Violet Engel for funding much of this project.

Thank you to each of you who have helped to care for our properties in ways large and small. You are part of God's gifts to Grace and I am so grateful for your service to God in this place.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE MEMORIAL GARDEN AND COLUMBARIUM COMMITTEE 2023

The Grace Church Memorial Garden and Columbarium Committee (MGCC) oversees the Columbarium consisting of the stone niches located in Memorial Garden which are available for the immurement of the ashes of parishioners and members of the community. The MGCC is also responsible for overseeing the Garden itself. The Garden is a quiet place for relaxation and meditation for both church and community enjoyment. It is also used for various services, activities, and social gatherings. We carry out the maintenance of the Garden and are also responsible for the seasonal plantings in the urns in the garden and on the church steps. The low black iron fence that surrounds the Bark Maple tree, planted in memory of long-time parishioner, Linda Chisholm, contains the historic Washington Irving Ivy given to Franklin Babbit, the first Rector of Grace Church, by Irving from his home Sunnyside in Tarrytown, NY. Irving was gifted it by Sir Walter Scott from his garden at Abbotsford, England.

This past year we were again able to hold our two major fund-raising events, which help enable us to provide perpetual maintenance of the Garden and Columbarium. The first, the annual Mother's Day Plant and Bouquet Sale, a community favorite, is always successful in raising funds.

The second, the fall Garden Party, is an opportunity for fellowship and a chance to enjoy spending time in the Garden. This year our entertainment was provided by our own "(Not) Anonymous Four" led by Jan Valentine and including choir members Amy Lehman, Mia Leo, Paula Spruck, and Margie Winslow. As spring approaches, we look forward to seeing the Garden come to life and to hosting these events once again.

Out of a total 128 niches in the Columbarium, there are only 38 niches remaining for purchase. With that in mind, the Committee, with the help of member, John Colgan, an architect, is in the beginning stages of studying how we might expand the number of niches without disturbing the original design and serenity of the Garden.

We honor and respect the leadership of our recently departed friend and colleague, Karin Baere. She is deeply missed. And we are grateful for the participation of our members who served this year: John Colgan, Jennifer Giunta, Heidi Hill, Rod Langdon, Molly MacQueen, Sally Seiler, and Paula Spruck.

YOUTH ACTIVITIES

YOUTH COMMISSION

Overview

The Youth Commission at Grace Church is responsible for oversight of the church school, the junior youth group, the senior youth group, the confirmation class and other activities/programs targeted to children through 18 years of age. Sandra Rodriguez is the church school director, Jen Marraccino leads the Junior Youth Group, and Brian Murrell and Kristin Walsh lead the Senior Youth Group.

CHURCH SCHOOL and JUNIOR YOUTH GROUP

At this time, we have 8 children registered for church school, which continues to take place after the 9:30 service. We also have a Junior Youth Group, which has approximately 14 kids registered. All classes are being provided in-person indoors. The church school kids continue to meet in Bradley Chapel, while the Junior youth group meets in Fenton. We also continue to combine the groups when appropriate.

The church school strives to integrate its programs with the 9:30 am church service. Church school lessons are generally based on the Gospel readings for the week, and follow the Liturgical calendar. We have continued to use both the StoryMakers curriculum, as well as the Lesson Plans That Work curriculum, developed by the Youth Ministries of the Episcopal Church. Church School activities and lessons are also at times centered around current events and holidays. I try to start each new week by asking the children how their week was, and if anyone has anything they would like to share with the group. I often see lots of little hands raised as they eagerly wait their turn to share a special event or challenging moment from their week. The Lesson Plans That Work curriculum includes both an opening and a closing prayer, so even when we are using the StoryMakers lesson plan for that day, I try to start and end all church school lessons with a prayer. We are generally thanking God for opening our hearts and minds to the lessons of the week, and also thanking God for allowing us to be together and share in his beloved community.

Since there is always a gap between our last church school gathering and the New Year, I try to start out the New Year with a quick recap where we talk about the Christmas Pageant, and then start talking about the season of Epiphany and the beginning of the ministry of Jesus in the world. We move from Epiphany into Lent and then Easter. We were so lucky last year to have our resident Donkey, the lovely Ruby, lead us in a procession around the church before our Palm Sunday service. The children also once again participated in a Resurrection Scavenger Hunt after the service. In May, we had children from all of our youth groups sail on the Hudson River Sloop Clearwater. The children participated in the sailing classroom program where they investigated the ecology, history, and environmental challenges of the Hudson River. It rained the entire time we were sailing, and we were all thoroughly soaked by the end, but it was still fun! We ended Church School for the year in June, with our traditional picnic for the children and their families in Memorial Garden.

We once again kicked off our first day of Church School 2023 with the Blessing of the Animals on October 1st. Many parishioners came to have their beloved pets blessed during the service. This year we had our JYG kids read the story of St. Francis to our younger Church School kids, and then help them make simple pine cone bird

feeders. This year Grace Church also had a Community Blessing of the Animals event in Memorial Garden. It was quite a success, as many members of the community who do not necessarily come to church participated in the Blessing of the Animals, as well as many of our own parishioners. Several of our youth also helped Fr. Dustin with the Blessing certificates.

In November Grace Church also led a youth service project with the Reformed Temple of Rockland on the night of the Interfaith Service here at Grace Church. Several children from both Grace Church and RTR came together before the service to write letters to active military members serving overseas. The letters were filled with messages of love, hope, and holiday wishes. It was a great event, and we talked about having more interfaith activities with the kids from RTR.

This year we moved back into the Sanctuary for our annual Christmas Pageant. The children from both church school and junior youth group spent several weeks learning and rehearsing to retell the story of Jesus' birth. Thanks to the help of this amazing Grace Church Family, the children were once again able to put together a wonderful production.

CONFIRMATION AND BREAD FOR LIFE

We did not have any Grace Church youth participate in Confirmation last spring, but we are looking forward to a large confirmation class coming together soon. Most of our JYG kids have been together since they were very young, and I have discussed with Fr. Dustin how lovely it would be if they could all be confirmed together. Time will tell. We did however have a Bread For Life class in the Spring. We had 4 of our Church School kids come together one Saturday afternoon in June and spend time with Fr. Dustin in the sanctuary learning about our church and what it means to receive communion. The children then spent some time in the kitchen with me, baking bread to be consecrated and shared with the congregation on the following Sunday.

WHAT IS AHEAD?

We will continue to have both Church School and Junior Youth Group meet on Sundays following the 9:30 service. We are looking forward to more service opportunities for our youth in the months to come. If anyone has ideas about activities or service projects please reach out.

ADULT SPIRITUAL FORMATION & FELLOWSHIP

ADULT EDUCATION AND SPIRITUAL FORMATION COMMISSION Annual Report February 11, 2024

In 2023 the Adult Education and Spiritual Formation Commission continued its mission to offer topics and resources that nurture the spiritual life and growth of the congregation. Our general goal has been to sponsor

one event per month. Offerings in 2023 included the following:

To start off Lent, ASF sponsored its annual Quiet Day on February 25 at its usual location, the Chapel of St. John the Divine in Tomkins Cove, NY. Rev. Gwyneth Murphy facilitated. Turnout was comparable to past years (15-20), and attendees felt the time was meaningful.

On March 8, 15, 22 and 29 (all Wednesdays), ASF conducted a series of Lenten supper discussions/activities around the theme of prayer -- thanksgiving, praise, petition and intercession. For thanksgiving, the group created drawings/artwork. For praise, everyone looked at icons and tried to make their own. For petition, participants



considered the role of movement – the position of the body, kneeling, praying while walking, etc. And for intercession, people put together their own wooden Anglican rosaries from kits and learned how to use them. Soup, salad and bread were served each week, and each session ended with Compline.

On March 7, 14, 21 and 28 (all Tuesdays), ASF sponsored a spiritual memoir writing workshop led by parishioner/author Margie Winslow. She explained the difference between memoir and spiritual memoir and gave examples. Attendees (about 10 each week) were given writing prompts and time to write each week, and some shared their writing with the group.

The Sunday morning Discovery Group, led by Roy Kepler, continued through the spring. It was an informal Bible study based on the lectionary reading and using the devotional book "Disciplines," published by The Upper Room. The group met from 10:15 to 10:45 each Sunday (between the 9:30 and 11 am services). Though participants said they liked the study, low attendance prompted us to pause the group and look for a different time slot.

On June 14, parishioner and poet Lily Greenberg read from her forthcoming work, *Mrs. God*, as part of the ASF series on Faith and Art. Afterwards, Jan Valentine moderated a Q&A with Lily about how her faith interacts with her poetry.

On July 12 and 15, ASF installed a rented canvas labyrinth in Memorial Hall for parish and public use as a tool for meditation and prayer. While attendance was small, response was positive, suggesting that additional exposure to the labyrinth could lead to greater attendance over time. The commission is considering whether to purchase a canvas labyrinth at a cost of about \$2700.

On August 16, ASF sponsored a one-hour session of harp/poetry meditation in Memorial Garden, in which gentle harp melodies alternated with readings from scripture and poetry. The theme was Healing.In mid-

September, ASF launched three small groups, which met either at people's homes or at the church for a total of nine sessions – five during the fall, and four scheduled for Jan/Feb 2024. One group of 11 met on Tuesday evenings, a group of 12 met on Wednesday evenings, and a group of 5 met on Saturday mornings. All three groups used the Way of Love curriculum from the Episcopal Church website, and each session included a simple meal. Response was very positive, and the groups have all indicated they want to continue. ASF is currently discussing ideas about how to move forward.

On October 18, seismologist, geophysicist and parishioner Paul Richards gave a talk entitled "Oppenheimer, Nuclear Weapons, and the Meaning of Peace," about the state of nuclear weapons in today's world, how weapons testing is monitored, and about his work with government agencies negotiating test ban treaties. Paul also spoke about how his faith informs his opposition to the development and use of nuclear weapons, and offered biblical insights into the meaning of peace. The talk was well attended and well received.



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On November 15, early church

historian and parishioner Douglas Furth gave a talk entitled "Before the Gospels: Paul's Fiery Advice to a Divided Church," which focused on Paul's letter to the Galatians, considered by many scholars to be the earliest book of the New Testament. Also well attended, well received.

For Advent, ASF purchased 50 copies of *A Way to the Manger: Devotions for Advent and Christmas*, published by Forward Movement, and distributed nearly all of them to interested parishioners to supplement their daily spiritual practice.

Ongoing Offerings:

Men's Prayer Breakfast, led by Jeff McDowell, gathers in Patterson at 8 a.m. on the second and fourth Thursday of each month for discussion, prayer, reflection, and bagels and coffee. The group has met for more than 20 years and is open to men from Grace and outside of Grace. For more information, contact Jeff at jffmcdwll@hotmail.com.

The Women's Spirituality Group, led by Jan Valentine, meets the last Saturday of each month on Zoom to share concerns of the day, discernment, learning, and conversation. Meeting time is 10 to 11 a.m.

I want to thank all who have attended ASF meetings and/or assisted with events, especially Fr. Dustin, Kickie Fulmor, Ron Hammond, Carol Kepler, Emily Nevill, and Jan Valentine. SOCIAL MINISTRY COMMISSION REPORT

Our spirit of outreach not only continues but has expanded thanks to the involvement of many.

We continue collecting non-perishable food items each Sunday that are donated to People to People. This local organization puts food on the tables of struggling families, children, seniors, veterans and so many of the most vulnerable among us. Thank you to Charlie Cross for delivering the food donations regularly to People to People.

A small but efficient group of robust volunteers gather once a month to make approximately 100 bag lunches to feed the homeless in New York City for Midnight Run. New volunteers, groups, families and individuals are welcome and encouraged to participate.

In June we had a table at the Rockland Pride Center Event. It was a wonderfully attended event by our Grace community and beyond. This past year marked the 25th year for this family friendly event in downtown Nyack.

Our annual Giving Tree for the children at Nyack Center was in the narthex this year for the holiday season. Parishioners contributed gifts to be distributed for Christmas. Thank you to Paul Weiss for his coordination of this event, as well as to each parishioner that took part.

The Prayer Shawl group started by Social Ministry Commission has now branched off into its own as an extension of pastoral care under the direction of Ellie Harries and Christine Klinger.



In addition to our regular and ongoing out-

reach, our parish completed our year-long role in resettling a family from Afghanistan at the end of September. To remind you, we partnered with the not-for-profit organization, Hearts and Homes for Refugees. This interfaith mission has brought to light the plight of so many refugees and the needs both great (immigration & healthcare) and small (navigating a grocery store). This family came to us with most members speaking some English and yet needing compassion to navigate acclimating to a new country and all the nuances that entails. Our main focus, once our volunteers provided the family with a safe furnished home, clothing and food was help with

ESOL classes, education and employment. Our budget and finance committee also helped the family navigate full independence. A big thanks to the following people for embracing this family and dedicating much of

their time, energy and most of all compassion: Sondra Holt, Linda and Rod Langdon, Molly MacQueen, Bonnie and Robert Parsekian, Beth and Joe Paskowski, Kathy Sestak, Claudia Uccellini and Paul Weiss. It is with profound sorrow and deep gratitude that we extend a posthumous embrace and thanks to Karin Baere, whose compassionate spirit and dedication to serving others have left an indelible mark on our community. It has recently come to our attention that Karin was engaged in reading excerpts of the Bible with one of the family members, and their reading from the Quran with her, exemplifying her unwavering commitment to spiritual enrichment and personal connection. Karin is greatly missed by the family, as well as to the Social Ministry Commission of which she



was an integral part.

This year we made a \$5,000 donation to the charitable work of Episcopal Relief and Development. The hope is that if our budget allows, we can make this an annual donation.
